


NEWSLETTER

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PRISE is the acronym for the UPR “Ponce Research Initiative for Scientific Enhancement.” This program is funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) under grant #1R25 - GM096955 - 01, awarded to Dr. Edu Suarez,

Associate Professor of the Biology Department at the University of Puerto Rico in Ponce (UPRP). This proposal was written in collaboration with Prof. Grisobelle Virella-Corujo, Sponsored Research Officer and Chancellor’s Assistant for the External Resources and Development Office.

What are the program’s goals and objectives?

By fostering competitive research (with a particular focus on the biomedical sciences), UPR-PRISE will advance the mission and goals of UPR Ponce. The planned research activities will increase the intellectual and technical capabilities of our students, which will, in turn, create a pipeline of well-trained students expected to complete a bachelor’s in biological sciences and then pursue a PhD in that same field. The specific aims of this project are oriented towards student development and are achieved via the sponsoring of summer research internships at research-intensive institutions, the offering of a standardized verbal test course (aimed at improving GRE verbal scores and conversational English abilities), the promoting of responsible conduct in research, and the encouraging of community-based learning.

June Highlights

The RISE Program concluded the application process on June 4, 2012. We received 24 applications, all of which fulfilled the program’s minimum requirements. Candidates were invited to be interviewed by the evaluation committee (composed of four faculty members from UPR-P, one staff member from the Ponce School of Medicine and Health Sciences (PSMHS), and one staff member from UPR-P. After reviewing the data collected during the interview process, 14 students were selected to become part of the Ponce RISE Program (nine official members, five adjunct members). **CONGRATULATIONS!**

Over **15** students participated for two consecutive weeks in workshops that prepared them for the lifestyle they will have for the rest of their academic careers and which will begin in August of 2012.
